



Books for Belize

Belize is a small Central American country with many amazing and beautiful places to explore. It has the 2nd largest barrier reef in the world, rainforests with jaguars, monkeys, and exotic birds, beautiful beaches, sugar cane field and orange groves. But on a recent trip to serve as a literacy coach, I discovered that something important was missing?!?—

BOOKS!

While volunteering in four schools it was evident that there were very few books. Some classrooms had only a handful of books for students to read. The children shared that they did not have books at home. The staff dream of having a school library so children can access books for school and to read at home with their families.

You see, in Belize, English is the language that is taught in school, but most students speak a different language at home. In Central America books in Spanish are available. There are no children's bookstores, a few libraries in larger towns (an hour bus ride away), no elementary school libraries, and no book fairs to purchase books in English.

Can families in Sequim help? **YES!!!** During the month of April, schools all around Sequim will be participating in a book drive to gather books to help create libraries for schools in Belize. Please consider donating any new or gently used books and drop them off in the **Books for Belize** collection box at school. We will ship the books this spring so schools can set up and organize their new libraries to welcome their students next September. They will be so excited!
